

Legal organization: hierarchy







1st problem: aspect not explicitly incorporated into Brazilian law


Convention Article 2

Compatible

- human rights

- mutual respect

- sustainable development



2nd problem: inversion of priorities (practices)

- CONVENTION
 - Article 2

 Recognizing that communities, in particular indigenous communities, groups and, in some cases, individuals.

3rd problem: omission of federative policy



Convention Article 35

 The federal government shall inform States and Municipalities of theirs legislative and administrative obligations.
